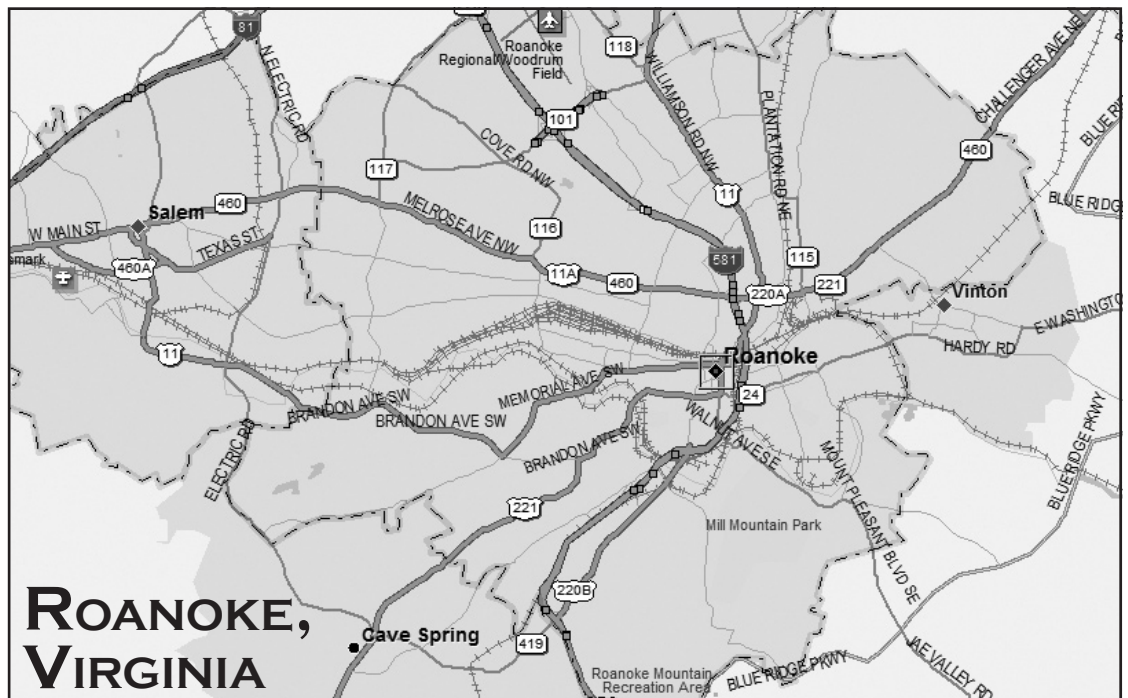

HOTEL ROANOKE

The Hotel Roanoke will again be our Convention Headquarters. The original Hotel Roanoke was built by the N&W in 1882. Renovated in 1994 the hotel reopened in April of 1995. The Hotel Roanoke carefully preserved the past with touches such as an antique-filled lobby, original Czech-made chandeliers, a restored Regency Room (home of our signature Peanut Soup), Pine Room (formerly an Officers' Club in World War II), and the Palm Court, the original ceiling of which was painted to show the constellations as they appeared in the skies the day the first train came to Roanoke in 1852.

Virginia Museum of Transportation

The Virginia Museum of Transportation is well known as the home of the famous N&W Class J 611 and N&W Class A 1218 both designed and built by N&W employees in Roanoke, Virginia. The collection also includes N&W Class G-1 6 built in 1897. N&W diesel fans will appreciate the SD-45 1776 and Alco C-630 1135. Virginian Railway fans will enjoy seeing the last surviving Virginian Railway steam locomotive Class SA 4 as well as Virginian Electric Locomotive Class EL-C 135 and caboose 321. You will also want to check out the new display *Virginian Railway: Roanoke's Other Railroad*. The museum is open from 10AM–5PM Monday–Saturday and 1PM–5PM on Sunday. Get your tickets for free admission from the sales table in the exhibit room. By foot you can cross the glass bridge over the tracks and follow the RailWalk to the museum. By car travel west on Shenandoah Avenue, left across the 5th Street Bridge and take the next left onto Norfolk Avenue to the museum.



The Glazed Bisque-it Tour

Do a fused-glass project by placing colored glass over contrasting color. Works can be large or small and you can glue on a pin to make a brooch. You are limited only by your imagination! Complete instruction is available for everyone from first timers to the experienced. Some railroad templates will be available but you can choose any subject. The staff fires the glass project overnight and you can pick it up the next day. You can also try your hand at pottery. Designs range from plates to mugs, candle holders to ceramic picture frames and much, much more. Paint on the design of your choice. Instructors will be available to help at every turn. Again, rail theme templates will be available or you can bring your own. Enter your creations in the “Mighty J” contest at the convention.



O. Winston Link Museum

The O. Winston Link Museum is located across the street from the Hotel Roanoke in the former N&W Railway passenger station. The collection is predominantly focused on the Norfolk & Western Railway. Link captured the last days of steam operation on the N&W in the late 1950s, but within the walls of its galleries, the museum offers much more than just photographs. The images created by Link are vignettes into history and sociology; they are art. They are a part of the history of photography and are a tool to share an era with every person. The museum is open from 10AM–5PM every day. An escorted tour will be held from 1-3PM on Friday. Get your tickets for free admission from the sales table in the exhibit room.

Lost Railroads of Roanoke Tour

We all know that Roanoke hosted our favorite railways the N&W and the Virginian. This tour will cover the “lost” railroads in Roanoke that many have forgotten. This trip for railroad archeologists will travel the lines of the Catawba Railroad, pass remnants of the never-completed Valley Railroad, and view what remains of the much-discussed narrow gauge Rorer Mine Railroad. The trip will also include a stop to view the 1905-vintage Snow Steam Pump with its 13-foot diameter, 11-ton flywheel that for over 50 years pumped water from Crystal Springs to downtown Roanoke. Two identical tours will be offered on Friday to accommodate Friday morning arrivals; the first departs from the hotel at 9:00AM and the second section departs at 1:00PM.

Beeds Indeed

Turn a string of beads of your own design into a necklace or bracelet. Many colors and materials, both common and imported, are available and you can place your fused glass piece on it. Prices vary. Instructors are available.

Shop Tour / Roanoke Chapter Excursion

We'll tour the famous Roanoke East End Shops where the legendary Class Js, As and Y6bs were constructed. Fifty years later, the proud tradition continues as the facility is now one of Norfolk Southern's finest locomotive shops for handling heavy repairs. We'll also visit the new NWHS/NS Archives facility in the GOB-East building. Our tour will finish with a box lunch ride on the Roanoke Chapter's N&W caboose 518409 behind either the Alco T-6 Switcher N&W 41 or GP-30 N&W 522 at the Chapter's 9th Street facility. For safety's sake be sure to wear sturdy shoes for this tour because a moderate amount of walking will be involved. Bring your hard hat and safety glasses if you have them, else we'll provide them.



Taubman Museum of Art

Tour the new Taubman Museum of Art, an 81,000 square-foot museum in downtown Roanoke. The new facility, designed by architect Randall Stout, is transforming Western Virginia with an architectural achievement like no other. The facility houses state-of-the-art exhibition galleries and a stellar permanent collection that provides an analogy for the city's evolution from industrial and manufacturing town to technology-driven city. The building's forms and materials evoke both the drama of the surrounding mountainous landscape of the Shenandoah Valley and the lyrically gritty industrial-era building culture of the great early 20th Century railroad boom, when Roanoke came to prominence as a switchpoint city of the new South.

Annual Banquet

Join us for an enjoyable buffet dinner with your choice of sirloin or chicken. Following our meal, we will dedicate a plaque to name the NWHS James N Gillum Archives. The Golden Arrow, Brakeman, H. Reid, and Precision Transportation awards will also be presented. Jim McClellan, retired Senior Vice-President for Planning at Norfolk Southern will be the keynote speaker. Jim was the thread throughout Rush Loving's book, "The Men Who Loved Trains."
